2004 PRIMARY ELECTION RESULTS FOR LOCAL GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND MEASURES

Voters approved nearly three-quarters of the local general obligation (GO) bond measures that appeared on the March 2, 2004 California Primary Election ballot. Local agencies presented voters with a total of 69 GO bond measures on their ballots as compared to only 25 measures on the March 2000 Primary Election ballot (an increase of 176 percent). The total dollar amount of GO bonds presented on local ballots was \$8.9 billion; of this amount, \$7.7 billion was approved by voters (see Table 1). The Rainbow Municipal Water District in San Diego County presented the only revenue bond measure on the March 2004 primary ballot. The measure, which failed by a 71.9 percent to 28.1 percent margin, required a simple majority vote for passage.

This article provides a summary and listing of all local GO bond measures on the Primary Election ballot.

K-12 Education – Fifty-four of the 69 GO bond measures presented for voter approval were for kindergarten through 12th grade facility improvements and new facilities. Fifty of the 54 measures required 55 percent voter approval, while the remaining four measures required two-thirds voter approval. Voters approved 39 of the 54 measures (72 percent). **College/University Education** – Twelve bond measures on the ballot were for college/university educational purposes. As with the K-12 bond measures, the college/university bond measures were for improving facilities and constructing new facilities. Each of the 12 measures required 55 percent voter approval to pass. Nine of the 12 measures (75 percent) were approved by voters.

Healthcare Facilities, Public Safety, and Recreational

Improvements – There was one bond measure each for healthcare facilities, public safety, and recreational improvements. Among other things, the bond measure for healthcare facilities was designated to improve laboratory facilities and modernize acute care facilities. The public safety bond measure would upgrade 911 emergency response systems and add space for paramedic/firefighter equipment to improve response times to fire/medical emergencies. The recreational improvement bond measure was dedicated to provide structures and facilities for dredging, redredging, widening and opening of navigable channels for a safe, recreational small boat channel. Each of the bond measures required two-thirds voter approval for passage. The healthcare facilities, public safety, and recreational improvement bond measures received 79.8 percent, 76.7 percent, and 84.9 percent voter approval, respectively.

CDIAC has tracked local and state bond and tax measures appearing in the Primary and General Elections for the past 18 years. The Commission receives election data from the county clerk and/or registrar in each county. A complete list of the local GO bond measures arranged by county appears in Table 2 on pages 6, 7 and 9.

CDIAC will issue a summary report on all local and state bond and tax measures considered in the 2004 California Primary Election, which should be available later this month.
