Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program Amendment to Resolution Number CSI 2020-03 (Second Funding Round) County of Los Angeles, Office of Diversion and Reentry

July 29, 2021

PURPOSE OF THE REQUEST:

The County of Los Angeles, Office of Diversion and Reentry (County) is requesting to change the scope of the project and the project description of its approved Community Services Infrastructure (CSI) Grant Program project.

BACKGROUND:

On March 26, 2020, the Authority approved a CSI grant for the County in an amount not to exceed \$5,300,945 to add at least 25 new psychiatric beds in an expanded jail diversion program at the Olive View Medical Center (OVMC) campus that would provide mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment, and trauma-centered services to at least 340 clients annually. On June 1, 2020 the County submitted a request to change the scope of the project and the project description. The County had determined that the operating costs of expanding inpatient psychiatric beds was significant, and the additional psychiatric beds would have required a considerate County contribution, which was no longer anticipated to be available due to the negative impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on County revenues, resulting in a loss of revenues. In an effort to fill the gap in the continuum of care and expand community alternatives to incarceration, the County re-evaluated its existing resources and requested to alter its initially approved project to a more feasible one. The County requested the Authority approve the proposed new project that is located in the Recuperative Care Center (RCC), a modular building at the OVMC campus with a reduced bed capacity from 25 beds to 12, while retaining all grant funds. The project description change was presented as an information item to the Authority Board in July 2020 (see Exhibit A). The current deadline to meet the readiness, feasibility, and sustainability requirement is July 30, 2021.

ISSUE:

Since presenting the project description change information item to the Authority board in July 2020, Authority staff has been working diligently with the County to obtain all of the necessary documentation to substantiate the request and determine if the project change would have been awarded if it had been the original concept at time of application.

Authority staff and its technical advisor initially had some concerns regarding the County's proposed changes to the CSI project, such as: supplanting of funds, project eligibility, and licensing and certification. The County provided supporting documentation confirming that the new proposed project does not supplant funds, that the project was located in a modular facility, which is eligible under the CSI program, and that no certification nor licensing is needed because the County will be paying directly for the treatment and services rendered and not bill Medi-Cal.

Additionally, the County has submitted all of the required documentation to support the Procedures for Addressing Requests for Project Description Changes - Review Matrix (see Exhibit B). After review of the documentation, Authority staff, its legal counsel, and its technical advisor from the California Institute for Behavioral Health Solutions have determined that the project is likely feasible and sustainable and would have been awarded had it been the original concept at time of application.

NEW PROPOSED PROJECT:

The proposed project will be located in the RCC building, a two-story 48-bed modular building on county-owned land. The awarded CSI grant of \$5,300,945 will fund 12 beds dedicated to the target population of justice-involved individuals to provide mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment, and trauma-centered services. The 12 new beds will serve approximately 72 clients annually. The new project will no longer provide inpatient psychiatric services nor competency restoration but will include individual psychiatric, psychological, and counseling services and treatment, group therapy, substance use treatment and services, medication monitoring, trauma informed care, substance use treatment and counseling, case management, short-term housing with medical oversight, and care coordination with the clients primary care physician while participating in the program and after discharge to ensure continuity of care for justice-involved clients (see Exhibits C and D).

The remaining 36 beds will be dedicated to another program operated by the County Department of Health Services. Services will be the same for all 48 beds, but with more enhanced treatment being provided to the justice involved individuals to address their specific needs. All common space will be shared by the two programs. Authority staff determined, based on the bed count, that the initial proportionate share for the CSI project is 25 percent. The total building cost of the RCC is \$20,537,000 (25 percent is \$5,134,250), leaving the County \$166,695 that may be used for furnishings/equipment, information technology, and three months of startup costs.

The RCC is currently under renovation and is located on the OVMC campus, which is also the same site where five crisis residential treatment projects and one crisis stabilization unit project, funded under the Investment in Mental Health Wellness Grant Program (IMHWGP), are being built. The IMHWGP projects and the CSI project are in separate locations on the Olive View campus. And because the RCC is currently under construction, it will allow the County to implement the CSI project more quickly. The County provided an updated project budget and timeline, and the project is scheduled to be open and operational by January 2022 (Exhibits E and F).

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Authority approve an amendment to Resolution Number CSI 2020-03 to change the scope of the project and the project description. All other conditions in the Resolution shall remain the same and in full effect.

AMENDMENT TO RESOLUTION NO. CSI 2020-03

A RESOLUTION OF THE CALIFORNIA HEALTH FACILITIES FINANCING AUTHORITY APPROVING EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF GRANT FUNDING UNDER THE COMMUNITY SERVICES INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT PROGRAM TO THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES

WHEREAS, The California Health Facilities Financing Authority (the "Authority"), a public instrumentality of the State of California, is authorized by Welfare and Institutions Code Section 5848.51, which created the Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program, and implementing regulations (California Code of Regulations, Title 4, Division 10, Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 7413)) to award grants for capital funding to finance eligible projects; and

WHEREAS, Authority staff reviewed the application submitted by the County of Los Angeles ("Grantee") against the eligibility requirements of the Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program and implementing regulations, and pursuant to the Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program and implementing regulations, recommends approval of a grant for the eligible project (the "Project"), as described in the Grantee's application and as more particularly described in Exhibit A to this Resolution (Exhibit A is hereby incorporated by reference);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the California Health Facilities Financing Authority as follows:

Section 1. The Authority hereby approves a grant for capital costs in the amount of \$5,300,945.00 to complete the Project within a grant period that ends on June 30, 2022. Within this grant period, Grantee shall provide evidence acceptable to Authority staff demonstrating the Project shall be operational on or before June 30, 2022. Funds shall not be disbursed if Grantee is unable to provide evidence acceptable to Authority staff that the Project is on track to be operational on or before June 30, 2022. Grantee must submit all capital cost disbursement requests, including required supporting documentation, to the Authority no later than April 30, 2022.

Section 2. The Executive Director, or the Deputy Executive Director, are hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of the Authority, to approve any minor, non-material changes in the Project described in the application submitted to the Authority and extend the grant period completion date identified in Section 1. Nothing in this Resolution shall be construed to require the Authority to provide additional funding, even if more grants are approved, exceeding available funding. Any notice to the Grantee shall indicate that the Authority shall not be liable to the Grantee in any manner whatsoever should such funding not be available for any reason whatsoever.

Section 3. The Executive Director, or the Deputy Executive Director, are hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of the Authority, to disburse funds not to exceed those amounts approved by the Authority for the Grantee. The Executive Director, or the Deputy Executive Director, are further authorized and directed, for and on behalf of the Authority, to execute and deliver to the Grantee any and all documents necessary to complete the disbursement of funds that are consistent with the Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program and implementing regulations.

<u>Section 4.</u> The Executive Director, or Deputy Executive Director, are hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of the Authority, to do any and all things and to execute and deliver any and all documents which the Executive Director, or the Deputy Executive Director, deems necessary or advisable in order to effectuate the purposes of this Resolution and the transactions contemplated hereby.

Section 5. All funds from this grant must be used in support of the Grantee's Project as described in Exhibit A to this resolution.

The proceeds of the grant will be used by the County of Los Angeles (County) as follows:

The County must add at least 25_12 new beds to expand the jail diversion program at a facility for mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment, and trauma-centered services. As a condition of funding, the grant can only fund eligible costs of projects, or portions of projects, implementing Jail Diversion Programs that provide on-site treatment services to the Target Population of Justice-Involved Individuals as defined under Section 7413(p), (q), (r), and (y) of the Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program regulations.

PURPOSE OF THE REQUEST:

The County of Los Angeles, Office of Diversion and Reentry (County) is requesting to alter the scope of both of its approved Community Services Infrastructure (CSI) Grant Program projects.

BACKGROUND:

The County submitted two CSI project applications that were approved by the Authority during two competitive funding rounds.

1st CSI Grant: Bell Recuperative Care Center (Round 1):

Resolution Number CSI 2019-01, approved by the Authority on July 25, 2019, authorized a CSI grant for the County in the amount of \$6,000,000 to add at least 75 new beds in a new jail diversion program that would provide mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment, and trauma-centered services to approximately 225 clients annually. Grant funds would have been used for renovation costs only, and the total cost of the project was \$9,029,298. The project was scheduled to be open and operational by October 31, 2021.

2nd CSI Grant: Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Psychiatric Bed Expansion (Round 2):

Resolution Number CSI 2020-03, approved by the Authority on March 26, 2020, authorized a CSI grant for the County in the amount of \$5,300,945 to add at least 25 new beds in an expanded jail diversion program that would provide mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment, and trauma-centered services to at least 340 clients annually. Grant funds would have been used for renovation costs and for furnishings and equipment costs, and the total cost of the project was \$5,974,345. The project was scheduled to be open and operational by June 30, 2022.

ISSUE:

According to the County, it has worked diligently toward the development and implementation of the approved CSI projects that would meet the CSI program requirements and approved timeframes. However, since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, the County encountered some challenges that would jeopardize the timeline and feasibility of the approved CSI projects. The two main challenges are a loss in County revenue and anticipated delays in obtaining a conditional use permit for one of the projects.

The loss in revenue affects the County's operational budget, while the delayed project completion schedule in construction could jeopardize the County's ability to meet the CSI Grant Program's deadline, currently statutorily set for June 30, 2022, which means all projects must be completed, be operational, and be fully disbursed prior to that date.

1st CSI Grant: Bell Recuperative Care Center:

The original project scope was to renovate a 100-bed psychiatric recuperative care interim housing site at the Salvation Army Bell Shelter in the City of Bell, of which 75-beds, funded by the CSI grant, would have been dedicated to justice-involved individuals. At the time of the CSI grant application, the County was advised by the Salvation Army that a conditional use permit was not needed for the proposed project. During the readiness phase of the project, the City of Bell informed the County that the project did require a conditional use permit, which would push back the start of construction. Additionally, the project would have required the County to enter a long-term lease with the Salvation Army, which was no longer financially viable due to the COVID-19 pandemic, resulting in a loss of revenue for the County.

2nd CSI Grant: Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Psychiatric Bed Expansion:

The original project scope was to add 25 psychiatric beds to serve the justice-involved population. The County has determined that the operating costs of expanding inpatient psychiatric beds is significant, and the additional psychiatric beds would have required a considerate county contribution, which is no longer anticipated to be available due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on County revenues, resulting in a loss of revenue.

NEW PROPOSED MODIFIED PROJECT:

In an effort fill the gap in the continuum of care and expand community alternatives to incarceration, the County re-evaluated its existing resources and is requesting to alter its initially approved projects to more feasible ones despite the revenue losses.

1st CSI Grant: LAC+USC Medical Center Recuperative Care Center:

The County is requesting to reduce the number of beds and change the location of the Bell Recuperative Center to a County-owned location, the LAC+USC campus, that is part of a bigger project where construction/renovation has already begun in July 2020. The total cost of the new Recuperative Care Center facility is \$24,145,000 for 96 beds, of which the awarded CSI grant of \$6,000,000 would fund 24 beds dedicated to the target population of justice-involved individuals to provide mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment and trauma-centered services. The new proposed 24 beds would serve approximately 144 clients annually. The County would like to maintain all funding for this project, change the project location, and reduce the initial approved bed count by 51 beds.

The LAC+USC campus is also the location where four Crisis Residential Treatment (CRTP) projects are being simultaneously developed and funded with Investment in Mental Health Grant Program (IMHWGP) grants. The IMHWGP projects and the CSI project have separate locations on the LAC+USC campus, as well as separate construction budgets and timelines (see Attachment 2 and 3).

2nd CSI Grant: Olive View-UCLA Medical Center Recuperative Care Center:

The County is proposing to reduce the number of beds approved in the initial project and make a change in the type of services provided. The proposed Olive View Medical Center Recuperative Care Center would be located in a two-story modular building on County-owned land, which is already under construction. The total cost of the new 48-beds facility is \$20,537,000, of which the awarded CSI grant of \$5,300,945 would fund 12 beds dedicated to the target population of justice-

involved individuals to provide mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment and trauma-centered services. The 12 new beds would serve approximately 72 clients annually. Psychiatric recuperative care services would be provided to ensure continuity of care for justice-involved clients residing in the existing 18-bed psychiatric unit. The County would like to maintain all funding for this project, reduce the initial proposed bed count by 13 beds, and not provide psychiatric inpatient services any longer.

The Olive View campus is also the location where five CRTP's projects and one Crisis Stabilization Unit project are being developed that are funded with IMHWGP grants. The IMHWGP project and the CSI project would have separate locations on the Olive View campus, as well as separate construction budgets and timelines (see Attachment 5 and 6).

PROGRESS:

The new CSI projects would be located at two County-owned locations where construction for IMHWGP projects is currently under way. The County has already begun the pre-construction processes at both locations, which would allow the County to implement the CSI projects more quickly. A new budget and timeline were developed for each site, and the projects are scheduled to be open and operational by June 2022.

The CSI program deadline is currently statutorily set for June 30, 2022, which means all projects must be completed, be operational, and be fully disbursed prior to that date. Any funds that are not disbursed by the deadline or are forfeited will automatically revert to the general fund.

NEXT STEPS:

Authority staff has concerns regarding the County's proposed changes to the initial approved CSI projects, not only the reduction in the number of beds, but also the new projects appear to be integrated into already pre-existing projects that are underway, raising concerns about the use of funds.

In light of the challenges that all the counties are facing due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the potential for other grantees to request CSI project changes, staff is seeking general direction from the Board regarding the County's proposed changes to the CSI projects, as well as specific project parameters that the Board is willing to entertain. Below are potential options that may be considered:

1. Direct staff to further discuss changes to the projects with County, providing staff with direction as to what terms might be acceptable to the board.

- 2. Do not support the proposed changes and direct staff to deny the new projects. This would mean the County would likely forfeit the funding due to the financial and contractual challenges, and grant funds would revert back to the general fund.
- 3. Support the proposed changes and direct staff to prepare approval of the project changes for an upcoming Authority meeting, allowing the County to keep the full grant award amount.
- 4. Support the proposed changes with reduced grant funding, and direct staff to prepare approval of the project changes for an upcoming Authority meeting with a reduced grant award amount proportionate to the bed reduction. The remaining funds would revert back to the general fund.
- 5. Direct staff to engage in statutory changes to the CSI deadline in order to be able to open a third CSI funding round with any forfeited funds.

The County of Los Angeles (County) Department of Health Services (DHS) Office of Diversion and Reentry (ODR) is requesting a change to the project scope for the grant awarded on July 25, 2019 in the amount of \$6,000,000 for the first round of funding for the Community Services Infrastructure. The original project scope was to renovate a 100-bed psychiatric recuperative care interim housing site at the Salvation Army Bell Shelter in the City of Bell, of the 100 beds, 75 would be dedicated to justice involved individuals.

During the readiness stage of this project, the County and our partner JWCH Institute (JWCH) have encountered challenges that would jeopardize the timeline of the project. The City of Bell has informed DHS that the project will require a Conditional Use Permit which would push back the start date of construction. Additionally, the project would require the County to enter into a long-term lease with the Salvation Army which is no longer financially viable to the County due to COVID-19 and the resulting loss of revenue.

The County would like to change the project scope to funding capital costs for LAC+USC Medical Center Recuperative Care Center (LAC+USC RCC). The LAC+USC RCC will be built on County land and will include 96 beds. The total cost of the project is \$24,145,000, and with the grant amount of \$6,000,000, 24 beds would be dedicated to justice involved individuals leaving County jails. All 24 beds will have access to mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment and/or trauma centered services. The scheduled completion date of LAC+USC RCC is May 2021.



The County of Los Angeles (County) Department of Health Services (DHS) Office of Diversion and Reentry (ODR) is requesting a change to the project scope for the grant awarded on March 26, 2020 in the amount of \$5,300,945 for the second round of funding for the Community Services Infrastructure to expand Olive View-UCLA Medical Center (OVMC) 6C/D by adding 25 psychiatric beds to serve the justice involved population. The operating cost of inpatient psychiatric beds is significant and the 6C/D beds would have required net county contribution which is no longer anticipated to be available due to COVID-19 and the resulting loss of revenue.

The County would like to change the project scope to funding capital costs for the OVMC Recuperative Care Center (OVMC RCC). The OVMC RCC will be built on County land and will be a two-story modular building with 48 beds. The total cost of the project is \$20,537,000, and with the grant amount of \$5,300,945, 12 beds would be dedicated to justice involved individuals leaving County jails. All 12 beds will have access to mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment and/or trauma centered services. OVMC RCC will provide psychiatric recuperative care services to ensure continuity of care for justice involved clients residing in the current 18 bed 6C psychiatric unit. The scheduled completion date of the OVMC RCC is September 2021.


