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Letter from the Executive Director

Greetings,

On behalf of the California Health Facilities Financing Authority (CHFFA), I am pleased to provide the annual report for CHFFA's activities during calendar year 2025.

In 2025, CHFFA completed the issuance of 13 bond and note financings for eight California health facilities, which resulted in a total issuance of \$1,730,795,000. Additionally, CHFFA closed three loans totaling \$2,451,894 to small and rural health facilities through the Healthcare Expansion Loan Program II (HELP II).

We also disbursed grant funds to qualifying counties and health facilities through a number of different programs that we administer here at CHFFA. Through our three Children's Hospital Programs, we disbursed \$122,226,715.34 to nine hospitals. For our Investment in Mental Health Wellness Grant Programs, we disbursed \$18,442,542.89 in capital funding to six counties and \$2,047,153.23 in personnel funding to eight counties. The Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program disbursed a total of \$13,062,162.14 to three counties to expand access to jail diversion programs. The Specialty Dental Clinic Grant Program disbursed a total of \$2,312,111.22 to three grantees to expand access to dental services for patients with special health care needs.

CHFFA also continued the administration of the Distressed Hospital Loan Program collaboratively with the Department of Health Care Access and Information (HCAI), which offered interest-free, working capital loans to non-profit and publicly operated financially distressed hospitals to prevent the closure of/or facilitate the reopening of the hospital. Through this program, CHFFA and HCAI approved and implemented a two-step loan modification process and approved 14 loan modifications for a 12-month extension of the payment deferral period and the maturity date.

Calendar year 2025 was a tremendous success for the various programs offered at CHFFA, and we very much look forward to further serving the people of the State of California through 2026 and beyond.

CHFFA OVERVIEW

CHFFA was established in 1979 for the purpose of providing financial assistance to public and private, non-profit health care providers in California. The diverse nature of the facilities funded by CHFFA reflects the vast health care needs of California. From rural, community-based organizations to large, multi-hospital systems, CHFFA has financed a wide variety of providers and programs throughout the state, through the issuance of bonds, loans, and grants.

As one of many financing authorities within the California State Treasurer's Office, CHFFA is a valuable resource for assistance in financing both small and large private, non-profit, or public health facilities. In order to meet the requirements for CHFFA financing, an institution must be a public health facility, a private non-profit corporation, or an association authorized by the State of California to operate a health facility and undertake the financing or refinancing of a project.

BOND, TAX-EXEMPT EQUIPMENT, & COMMERCIAL PAPER PROGRAMS

CHFFA offers a **Bond Financing Program**, a **Tax-Exempt Equipment Financing Program**, and a **Commercial Paper Program** to provide financial assistance for a variety of projects for California's public and private non-profit health facilities.

Bond Financing Program

The **Bond Financing Program** provides eligible health facilities with access to low interest rate capital markets through the issuance of tax-exempt and taxable revenue bonds. Bond proceeds may be used to fund construction/renovation projects, land acquisition for future projects, acquisition of existing health facilities, refinancing of existing debt, working capital, and to pay costs of issuance. As of December 31, 2025, CHFFA had **98** outstanding bond issuances totaling approximately **\$17.7 billion**.

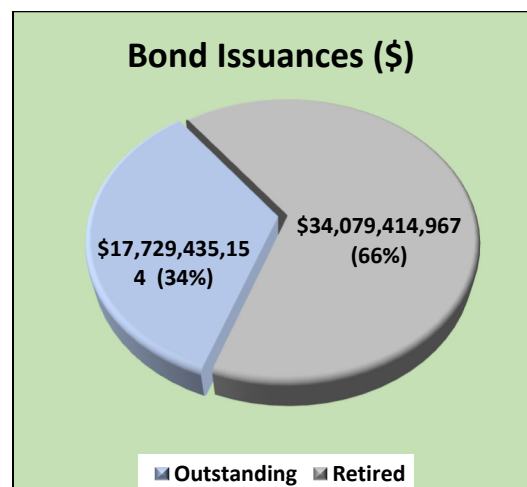
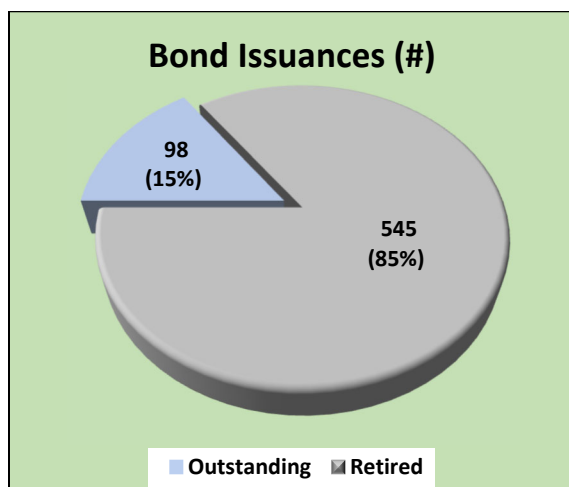

Tax-Exempt Equipment Financing Program

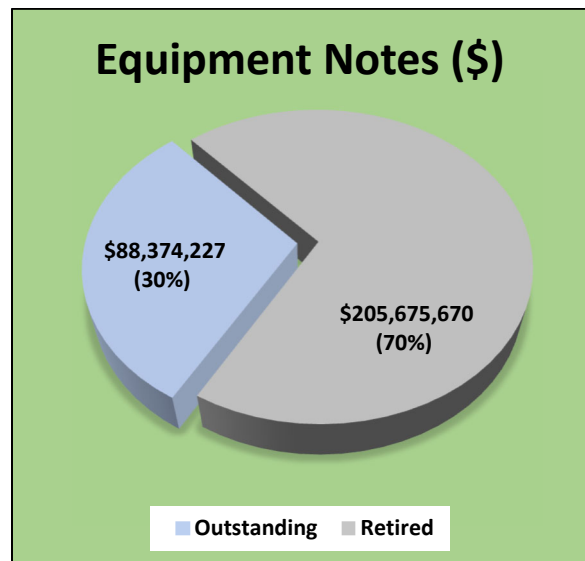
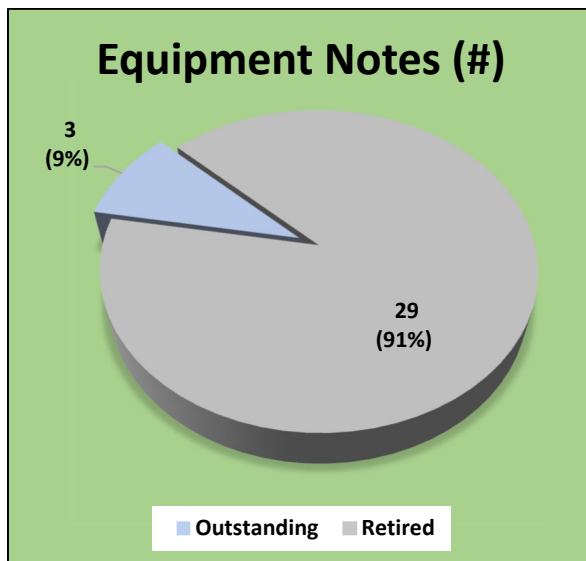
The **Tax-Exempt Equipment Financing Program** provides eligible health facilities with access to tax-exempt, fixed rate financing for equipment purchases. As of December 31, 2025, CHFFA has **three** outstanding tax-exempt equipment notes in the approximate amount of **\$88.4 million**.

Commercial Paper Program

The **Commercial Paper (CP) Program** allows borrowers to issue multiple, short-term notes to coincide with the funding need for costs associated with construction projects. Stanford Health Care is the only CHFFA borrower currently utilizing the CP Program. CHFFA did not issue any commercial paper notes in 2025.

Healthcare Expansion Loan Program II (HELP II)

HELP II is designed to provide eligible small and rural health facilities and district hospitals with financing for capital project needs through low-cost loans. As of December 31, 2025, CHFFA had **67** outstanding loans in the approximate amount of **\$42.7 million**.

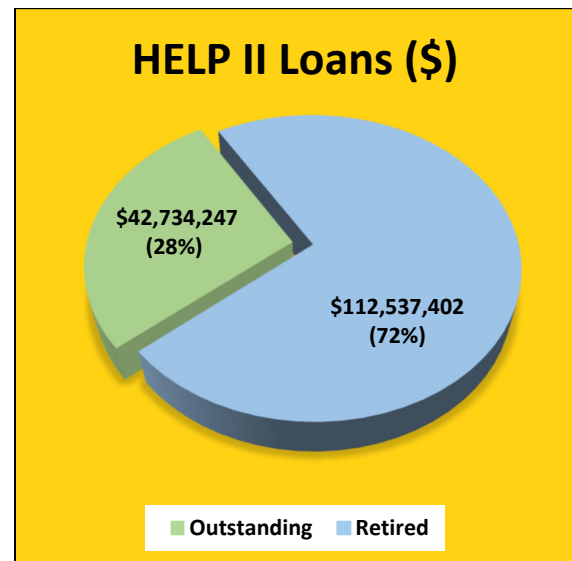
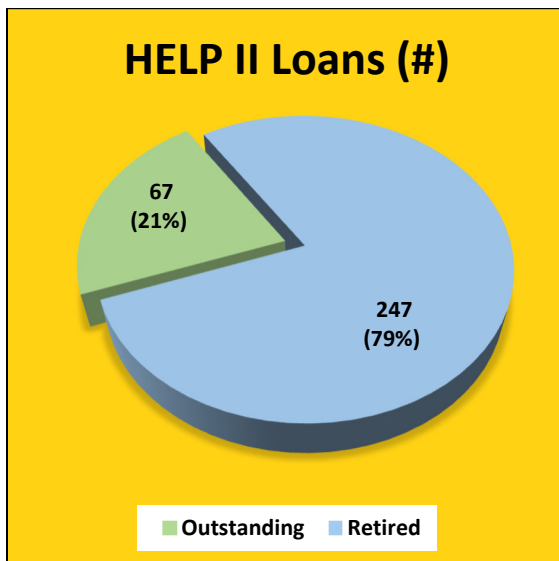

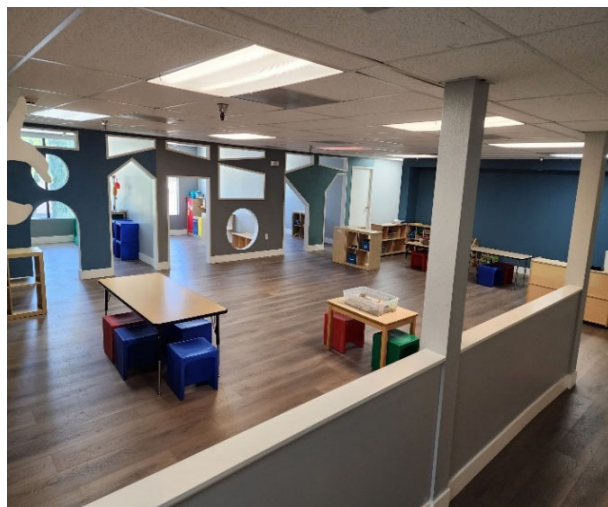

Nondesignated Public Hospital Bridge Loan Programs

The **Nondesignated Public Hospital Bridge Loan Program (NDPH I)** was originally established in 2021 to provide 0% interest rate loans to eligible nondesignated public hospitals experiencing financial delays associated with the transition from the Public Hospital Redesign and Incentives in Medi-Cal Program to the Quality Incentive Program. The initial program authorized \$40 million in loans, was implemented and administered, and is no longer active. In June 2022, an additional \$40 million was appropriated, creating the **Nondesignated Public Hospital Bridge Loan Program II (NDPH II)** for the same purpose and with similar parameters as the first program.

Under NDPH II, **six hospitals** repaid their loans in the amount of **\$25.1 million**, and **three** hospitals have loans outstanding, totaling **\$14.2 million**.

In July 2025 **Assembly Bill 102** and **Assembly Bill 104** were passed, extending the repayment period and modifying the repayment terms of NDPH II loans **allowing monthly payments** instead of a one-time balloon payment. NDPH II began receiving monthly repayments in December 2025.

Funding for both NDPH programs is no longer available as all monies have been awarded in loans.

Distressed Hospital Loan Program

The **Distressed Hospital Loan Program (DHLP)** was established through Assembly Bill 112 (Chapter 6, Statutes of 2023), to provide financial support to struggling nonprofit and public hospitals to either prevent the closure or facilitate the reopening of closed hospitals. Subsequently, Assembly Bill 118 (Chapter 42, Statutes of 2023) was signed into law, increasing the amount of funds available for DHLP by an additional \$150 million, bringing the cumulative funding available for the program to \$300 million.

DHLP offered 0% interest rate, 72-month term loans, with an 18-month payment deferment period.

In 2025, CHFFA and HCAI worked with the Department of Finance to create a two-step loan modification and loan forgiveness process. Borrowers could apply for a 12-month extension of payment deferrals and loan maturity, not to exceed July 1, 2031, and borrowers that continue to experience financial hardship following the 12 month extension could then apply annually for loan forgiveness of 12 months of debt service payments.

In 2025, CHFFA and HCAI approved 14 loan modifications extending the loan terms to 84 months, with a 30-month payment deferment period.

Children's Hospital Program of 2004

In November 2004, voters passed Proposition 61, enabling the State of California to issue \$750 million in bonds for capital improvement projects for children's hospitals across California, consisting of eight private non-profit children's hospitals and five University of California children's hospitals.

All awards and disbursements have been completed, and the program is no longer accepting applications.

Children's Hospital Program of 2008

In November 2008, voters passed Proposition 3, enabling the State of California to issue an additional \$980 million in bonds for similar uses to the Children's Hospital Program of 2004.

Grant funds in the amount of **\$9,006,654.85** are available for the third funding round, on a first-come, first-served basis for applications received from any University of California children's hospital.

In 2025, CHFFA approved **one** grant award for approximately **\$844 thousand** and made **four** disbursements totaling approximately **\$14.7 million** to **one** hospital.

Children's Hospital Program of 2018

In November 2018, voters passed Proposition 4, enabling the State of California to issue an additional \$1.5 billion in bonds to the 13 children's hospitals and public or private, non-profit hospitals that provide pediatric services for children eligible for California Children's Services.

Investment in Mental Health Wellness Grant Programs

The **Investment in Mental Health Wellness (IMHW) Grant Program** was designed to improve access to mental health crisis services available to California residents by funding a major statewide expansion of Crisis Residential Treatment Programs, Crisis Stabilization Units, and Mobile Crisis Support Teams (MCSTs) through grants available to counties.

In **2025**, CHFFA disbursed **\$7 million** to **one** county. All IMHW grant projects are complete. The program is no longer accepting new applications.

Investment in Mental Health Wellness Grant Program for Children and Youth (IMHW CY)

In 2016, the IMHW Grant Program was expanded to specifically address a continuum of crisis services for children and youth by funding expansion of the above services to individuals 21 years of age and under.

In **2025**, CHFFA disbursed approximately **\$11.4 million** in capital funding to **five** counties and approximately **\$2 million** in personnel funding to eight counties.

Currently, the program is not accepting new applications. However, CHFFA expects to open a sixth funding round to reallocate the forfeited funds in the future.

Calendar Year 2025 IMHW Grant Disbursements

In 2025, CHFFA made 22 disbursements to 12 counties for a total amount of **\$20,489,696.12**, which included **\$18,442,542.89** in capital funding and **\$2,047,153.23** in personnel funding. The following table provides a summary of CHFFA's IMHW grant disbursements in 2025.

Community Services Infrastructure Grant Program

In 2016, CHFFA was authorized to allocate approximately \$65.8 million through the **Community Services Infrastructure (CSI) Grant Program** to expand access to jail and prison diversion programs and other related services for those with mental health illnesses, substance use disorders, or trauma.

In 2025, CHFFA disbursed funds of approximately **\$13 million** to **three** counties. All CSI projects are complete. The program is no longer accepting new applications.

Specialty Dental Clinic Grant Program

On June 30, 2022, the Specialty Dental Clinic Grant Program (Dental Program) was chaptered into law through the annual Budget Act of 2022 (Section 47, Chapter 45, Statutes of 2022) authorizing the Authority to administer a \$25 million competitive grant program to disburse funds for the purpose of supporting the construction, expansion, modification, or adaptation of specialty dental clinics in California. On June 27, 2023, the Dental Program was allocated an additional \$25 million through the passing of the Budget Act of 2023 (Section 2.00, Chapter 12, Statutes of 2023), bringing the cumulative amount to \$50 million, of which \$47.5 million was allocated for grant awards and \$2.5 million was allocated for program administration costs.

The Dental Program aims to support special health care needs populations by increasing timely access, reducing geographic shortages, increasing equity, and supporting quality of care, while also encouraging prevention services, early intervention, behavior support service and intervention, provider education, and community outreach activities that bring care to community sites.

The first funding round application submission deadline was April 1, 2024, and CHFFA received **111** applications, requesting approximately **\$303 million** in grant funding. In February 2025, the CHFFA board awarded **\$47.5 million** for **13** grant projects. However, two grantees forfeited their entire grant awards totaling approximately \$7.9 million due to the uncertainty of Medi-Cal reimbursements and concerns about being able to meet the Dental Program requirement of operating for 10 years with a 50% special health care needs patient caseload. CHFFA anticipates that the remaining approximately **\$39.6 million** in awards to **11** Dental Program projects will create **114** new dental operatories to provide dental services to approximately **37,835** special health care needs patients annually. CHFFA expects to open a second funding round to reallocate the forfeited funds in the future.

Dental Program Project Status

The 11 Dental Program grant projects are at different phases of project activity. Six grant projects are currently under construction, two grantees are finalizing the execution of construction contracts, two grantees are in the process of identifying a site for facility acquisition, and one grantee is pending execution of its grant agreement.
